

Record result for One Point Six at Kensington's Observatory Gardens

Apartment project at prestigious Northacre scheme delivers early success for Caroline Takla's new development firm




Recently-launched development outfit One Point Six has achieved an impressive result with one of its first projects, boosting the value of a flat in Observatory Gardens by nearly 50% and setting a new price per square foot record for the well-regarded scheme.

Having been acquired by sister company
The Collection for £1.98m in the
aftermath of the Brexit vote, the team
spent the best part of a year turning the
property into a "sophisticated" three-bed
residence, with two balconies, 24-hour
concierge, and underground parking. The
finished article was offered up with a
year's full management package from
luxury concierge provider
Quintessentially.

We hear contracts have now been exchanged at £2.89m, with a rate of over £2,500 psf setting a new record for the development.

Originally the former residence of the Phillimore family, the impressive building off Campden Hill Road was bought by the astronomer Sir James South in 1827, who



built an observatory in the gardens and

renamed it Observatory House. South was president of the Astronomical Society of London during the 1800s, and it was under his name that the institution became The Royal Astronomical Society, after obtaining a royal charter in 1831. He was the owner of the world's largest telescope during the time, and called in who else but Isambard Kingdom Brunel to construct an dome in his garden to accommodate it. Having suffered bomb damage during World War II, the building fell into serious disrepair but was brought back from the brink by Northacre as luxury apartments, which remain some of the most sought after in PCL.

One Point Six described the redesign as an "homage" to South and his profession, incorporating shining brass detailing, spherical chandeliers by Gallotti & Rice and grand sash windows help reflect light and space, with dusky pink fabrics, Carrara marble and chevron oak flooring creating a "warm and inviting atmosphere".

Co-Founder and Director of One Point Six, Caroline Takla: "As with all our projects, Observatory Gardens was completely unique in its layout and design, and we commissioned bespoke artwork, furniture and soft furnishings that can't be found anywhere else. We played on the area's astronomy

background, by maximising natural light and including interior detailing, such as rs which create a focal point within each

spherical and lens-style lamps and chandeliers which create a focal point within each room.
